



Ukraine Response Oversight

Quarterly Fact Sheet as of January 1, 2024

The complexity, scale, and speed of the U.S. government’s response to Russia’s war against Ukraine demands robust oversight. The U.S. Department of State (Department) and U.S. Agency for Global Media (USAGM) response to the war is the top oversight priority for the Office of Inspector General (OIG).

OIG is leveraging its extensive knowledge of the programs and operations of the Department and USAGM to provide timely oversight of the Ukraine response effort, as well as critical information for Congress and the U.S. taxpayer.

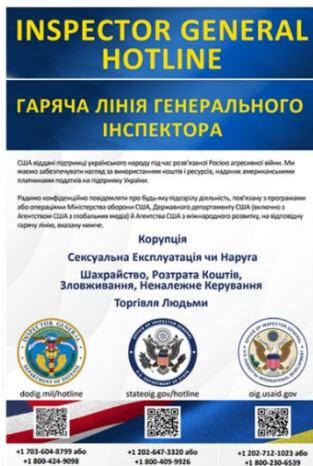
- **100+ OIG personnel**, including auditors based in Kyiv, are supporting Ukraine response oversight efforts.

OIG’s risk-targeted, agile approach to oversight has produced a robust body of work.

- OIG has issued **18 related reports** with **72 recommendations** and has an additional **19 ongoing and planned** Ukraine-related projects.
- Work is focused on key risks in the Department’s response effort:
 - Setting clear strategies and providing needed coordination.
 - Establishing effective operations.
 - Monitoring and evaluating programs and activities.
 - Countering corruption and fraud.

Congress has appropriated \$113.4 billion for the Ukraine response to more than a dozen departments and agencies. To provide comprehensive oversight of the wider U.S. response, OIG is coordinating with offices across the inspector general community.

This collaboration has yielded two Joint Strategic Oversight Plans covering the Ukraine response. These plans, including the [FY 2024 Plan](#), provide information on completed, ongoing, and planned oversight projects across the U.S. government. Inspectors General will also collaborate to publish joint quarterly reports on the Ukraine response. These reports will provide a unique one-stop shop for information on the progress of the response effort and related oversight activities.



OIG employs a three-pronged approach to preventing and detecting fraud, waste, and abuse in Ukraine:

1. Assessing the impact of Department programming aimed at countering corruption and illicit diversion.
2. Providing oversight of Department controls and safeguards against fraud, waste, and abuse in the assistance it provides.
3. Maintaining a robust Ukrainian and Russian language hotline, the investigative capacity to respond to incoming allegations, and partnerships with U.S. and Ukrainian law enforcement and prosecutorial counterparts to drive consequences for substantiated wrongdoing.
